#### **SUMMARY**

Designates multiple memorial highways, bridges, and similar locations.

#### **DETAILED ANALYSIS**

#### **Memorial designations**

The bill designates the following highways, bridges, and similar locations. It authorizes the Director of Transportation to erect suitable markers along those locations indicating their names.
