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## Fiscal Note & Local Impact Statement

**Bill:** H.B. 347 of the 132nd G.A.

**Subject:** Designates various memorial highways

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### State & Local Fiscal Highlights

- The Ohio Department of Transportation and various municipalities would incur costs of approximately \$350 to \$400 per set of signs to produce and install signs on each of the 17 designated memorial highways in the bill.

### Detailed Fiscal Analysis

The bill designates 17 new memorial highways and bridges on portions of various interstate highways, U.S. routes, and state routes throughout Ohio. Overall, the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) and the associated municipalities would incur costs of approximately \$350 to \$400 per set of signs, depending on sign size and equipment needed, to produce and install signs on each of the designated memorial highways in the bill. Once a set of signs is installed, there are typically no maintenance costs unless the signs are damaged. Signs are usually in need of replacement every 12 to 15 years.

The cost of signage to mark the portion of a highway designated as a memorial is paid either entirely by ODOT or shared between ODOT and the municipal corporation through which the roadway passes. ODOT pays for all of the signage production costs. However, the installation costs may be borne by municipalities, depending on where the designated portion of highway begins and ends. ODOT pays installation costs for signs that are to be located outside of municipal boundaries, as well as the signs on all interstate routes. In cases where the memorial highway begins or ends inside of a municipal corporation, the city or village is responsible for installing the signage inside its boundaries. In cases where only a portion of a designated memorial highway lies in a municipal corporation, ODOT and the city or village may share the installation costs.

The table below summarizes these memorial designations in the order that they appear in the bill, including the location of the highway and the entity responsible for paying signage installation costs.
