The Department of Children and Youth (DCY)<sup>1</sup> might experience a reduction in administrative costs due to the bill's provision that exempts home education learning pods from licensure and regulation as a child care center or family child care home. If any of these pods currently hold a license, there could be a decrease in associated regulatory costs and a subsequent loss in license fee revenue. There should be no direct impact associated with the bill's provision that prohibits a county or township from restricting or limiting the location of home education learning pods within any district/zone in the county or township.
